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Hello, and welcome

Congratulations on the Motorola Razr Fold (2026) — a lovely phone. This guide walks you through it in plain, friendly English: no jargon, no rabbit holes, just the things that actually help.

I'm Bill, and I run Bill's Home Tech here in Portage County, Ohio. I've spent 30+ years helping folks get comfortable with their technology — patiently, in plain language, and at their own pace. Think of this guide as me sitting at your kitchen table, pointing things out one at a time.

Your Motorola Razr Fold (2026) runs Android — the software made by Google — with Motorola's own light touch on top, which they call Hello UX. It's clean and close to plain Android, without a lot of clutter. Don't worry about the names; I'll show you what matters.

You do not have to read this all at once, and you certainly don't have to memorize it. Skip to whatever you need, keep it in the drawer with your appliance manuals, and know that a real person is only a phone call away.

★ How to use this guide

Each page stands on its own. Read one, try it on your phone, and come back for the next when you're ready. If a step ever feels fuzzy, that's on the writing — not on you — and you can always call me at (330) 200-8042.

What makes the Motorola Razr Fold (2026) special

Here are the things worth knowing, in plain English — no need to remember the fancy names.

It opens into a small tablet

This is the headline. Closed, it's a normal 6.6-inch phone. Open the book fold and you have a big 8.1-inch screen — marvelous for reading, maps, video and anything where a bigger, clearer picture helps. It's Motorola's first phone of this kind.

The best software support Motorola offers

Motorola promises a full 7 years of updates on this one — the longest in its whole lineup, and a match for Apple, Samsung and Google. On a pricey phone you'll keep a while, that matters.

Unlocks by fingerprint OR by looking at it

Alone among these Motorolas, the Razr Fold is confirmed to offer both a fingerprint reader and face unlock — so you can pick whichever is easier for you.

A big battery and very fast charging

A large 6,000 mAh battery keeps that big screen going, and it charges very quickly (up to 80 watts with a cable, 50 watts wirelessly).

A quick tour of the buttons

This phone opens like a book. A handful of buttons run the whole thing — here's what each one does.

- The **power button** on the side turns the screen on and off — and it's also the **fingerprint reader**. A light rest of your finger on it unlocks the phone.
- The **volume buttons**, just above the power button, make sounds louder or softer.
- The **charging port** on the bottom is the modern USB-C shape — the same kind of cable many newer gadgets use.

Everything else happens by tapping the glass with a fingertip. A single, gentle tap is all it takes — no need to press hard or tap twice.

! A folding screen and hinge like a gentle touch

The big inner screen folds in half, which makes it a bit more delicate than an ordinary screen. Don't jab it with a fingernail, don't force it flat, and keep sand and grit out of the hinge. Handle it gently and it'll serve you well for years.

✓ It's a big phone — two hands and a good grip

Opened up, this is a large, heavier phone. The big screen is wonderful, but it really wants two hands. A grippy case and a pop-out grip or ring on the back make it much easier to hold and much harder to drop.

Setting it up, step by step

Setting up your Motorola Razr Fold (2026) takes about twenty minutes, most of which is the phone doing the work while you sip your coffee.

- 1. Charge it up.** Plug it in for a bit so it has plenty of power for setup.
- 2. Turn it on and follow along.** Hold the power button until you see the Motorola "hello" animation, then follow the friendly on-screen prompts. They walk you through picking your language, joining your home Wi-Fi, and setting up your fingerprint. You can do all of this with the phone open on the big screen — it's roomier for the setup.
- 3. Sign in with your Google Account.** This is the email (usually a Gmail address) and password that ties your apps, photos and settings together. If you've had an Android phone or used Gmail before, use the same one. If you're brand-new to it, the phone helps you make one.

✓ Write down your Google Account

Your Google Account email and password are the keys to everything on an Android phone. Write them on paper and keep them somewhere safe at home. If you ever get stuck, that little note saves the day — and I can help you set it up so you're not guessing.

Bringing everything from your old phone

The good news: your photos, contacts and messages can come with you. You don't start from scratch.

From another Android phone, the setup screen offers to **copy your apps and data** over. The easiest way is with a cable between the two phones (one usually comes in the box); the old phone can also restore from its Google backup over Wi-Fi. Either way it brings your contacts, photos, apps and settings across.

Coming from an iPhone? That takes a little more care, but it's very doable — Google's setup helps move your contacts, photos, calendar and messages over, using a cable or your Google account. This is one of the most common calls I get, and I'm glad to sit with you and make sure nothing's left behind.

★ Don't want to risk losing anything?

Moving to a new phone is my single most-requested house call. For a flat \$99 I'll come to you, move everything over, get your email and contacts working, and make sure nothing's left behind before I leave. Call (330) 200-8042.

Making the screen easy on your eyes

Your phone can make everything bigger and clearer. These are the settings I turn on for folks most often.

Open **Settings** (the gear icon), then **Display**. Look for **Font size** and drag the slider until the words feel comfortable. Right beside it is **Display size**, which makes the icons and buttons bigger too.

For even more, go to **Settings > Accessibility > Display size and text**. There you can push the text larger still, turn on **Bold text** for heavier letters, and boost **contrast** so things stand out more.

Prefer to magnify part of the screen on the fly? **Accessibility > Magnification** lets you triple-tap to zoom into any spot, then tap again to zoom back out.

✓ One handy shortcut: Google Lens

Your camera doubles as a magnifying glass. Open the Camera or the Google app, point it at small print — a menu, a pill bottle, a warranty card — and it can enlarge the words and even read them aloud. I'll show you how to keep it one tap away.

Making it easy to hear

A few settings make calls, videos and alerts easier to hear — and easier to follow.

The **volume buttons** on the side raise and lower sound. During a phone call, press the top volume button to make the caller louder.

Turn on **Live Caption** — it puts words on the screen for almost any video or audio, automatically, even without sound. Find it in **Settings > Accessibility > Live Caption** (or press a volume button and tap the little caption icon). Wonderful for videos and family clips when the sound alone is hard to catch.

The phone works with many modern **Bluetooth hearing aids**, sending call and video sound straight to them. And **Sound Amplifier** (in Accessibility) can use the phone's microphone with wired or Bluetooth earbuds to make nearby voices clearer — handy across a noisy room.

✓ Ask for captions on your TV shows too

Live Caption works right across the phone, so it can caption a YouTube clip, a voicemail, even a video a grandchild sends. It's one of Android's nicest features for hard-of-hearing folks — I'm glad to switch it on and show you.

Unlocking with your fingerprint

This phone opens with your fingerprint — quick, private, and for many people easier than typing a code every time.

During setup the phone asks you to rest your finger on the **side power button** a few times so it can learn your print. After that, a light touch on that button unlocks the phone, signs you into apps, and approves purchases.

You can add more than one finger — say a thumb and a forefinger, or a finger from each hand — in **Settings > Security & privacy > Fingerprint**. I'd add at least two so you're never stuck.

This phone can **also unlock by looking at it** (face unlock). You can set up your face in **Settings > Security & privacy** and use whichever is easier — face or fingerprint. Face unlock is handy, though the fingerprint is the more secure of the two.

✓ Always set a PIN too

Your fingerprint is the quick way in, but the phone also has a numbered PIN (or a pattern) as a backup — for when a finger is wet or cold. Pick something you'll remember, write it on paper, and keep it safe at home.

The Home Screen, arranged your way

The Home Screen is the wall of icons you see first. You can make it calmer and put your favorites front and center.

All your apps live in the App Drawer — swipe up from the bottom of the screen to see the full list. To put a favorite on your Home Screen, press and hold its icon in the drawer and drag it out.

To move an app, press and hold it until it lifts, then drag it where you want and let go. Put the apps you use most — Phone, Messages, Camera, Photos — on the very first screen, close to your thumb.

To tidy up, press and hold an app on the Home Screen and tap **Remove** — that takes it off the Home Screen but keeps it in the App Drawer, so nothing is lost. Your main screen stays clean.

You can also add big, easy-to-read **widgets** — a large clock, the weather, your calendar. Press and hold an empty spot, tap **Widgets**, and pick one.

The outside (cover) screen has its own layout you can arrange too — clock, weather, favorite people and little panels — so you can do quick things without opening the phone. We can set that up the way you like.

★ Let's make it simple together

Setting up a clean, senior-friendly Home Screen — big icons, only the apps you use, a large clock — is one of my favorite things to do on a visit. It makes the whole phone feel calmer. Call (330) 200-8042.

Want it even simpler? Set it up your way

There's no single "simple mode" button on Android, but with a few settings you can make this phone feel wonderfully calm and uncluttered.

The biggest wins are the ones we just covered: turn up **Font size** and **Display size** so text and icons are big and clear, and keep only the apps you actually use on the first Home Screen — everything else tucks neatly into the App Drawer.

Motorola's software helps here, because it's close to plain Android — there aren't piles of duplicate apps and pop-ups to wade through. Add a big clock widget, put Phone, Messages and Camera front and center, and the phone starts to feel like it was made just for you.

If you'd like it simpler still, there are free "easy" home-screen apps in the Play Store that show a few very large buttons — some folks love them. I'm happy to help you try one and switch back if it's not for you.

✓ A calm phone is a setup, not a different phone

Nine times in ten, "I want it simpler" just means bigger text, fewer icons, and the right apps in easy reach. That's a 15-minute job, and it makes an enormous difference. I'm glad to set it up with you.

Talking instead of typing

Typing on glass can be fiddly. The good news: you can just talk, and the phone listens.

Voice typing turns your voice into text. Any time the keyboard is on screen, tap the little **microphone** and speak — your words appear as you talk. Grand for texts, emails and notes without hunting for letters.

Google Assistant is the helper you speak to. Say "**Hey Google**" and then ask plainly: "Call my daughter," "Set a timer for twenty minutes," "What's the weather tomorrow?" or "Remind me to take my pills at eight." It's often faster than tapping, and it can be started with a button or gesture too — I can set that up.

✓ **Speak naturally**

You don't need special robot words — talk to the Assistant the way you'd ask a person. And if it mishears, just try again; nothing breaks. This is one of the most useful habits to build on a new phone.

The camera, made simple

Taking a good photo is easier than you'd think — the phone does the hard part.

Three rear cameras, all 50-megapixel: a main camera, a wide-angle that also does close-up "macro" shots, and a zoom camera that brings distant things closer without losing much quality. Because it folds, you can prop it open on a table for hands-free video calls, and use the cameras from either screen.

To take a photo: open the **Camera** app, point it at what you want, and tap the big round button. That's it. To see the photo you just took, tap the little thumbnail in the corner — or open the **Photos** app any time; every picture lands there automatically.

Pinch two fingers apart on the screen to zoom in, together to zoom back out. Tap the screen where you want the phone to focus, and it'll sharpen right up.

A neat Motorola trick: **twist your wrist twice**, like turning a doorknob, and the camera pops open — even from a locked screen. Perfect for catching a moment quickly.

✓ Your photos back themselves up

If you turn on **Google Photos** backup, every picture is safely copied to your Google account, so a lost or broken phone never means lost memories. I can make sure that's switched on for you.

Battery and charging

Keeping your phone charged is simple once you know the handful of things that matter.

A big 6,000 mAh battery — the largest in this whole group — which comfortably powers that large inner screen through a full day.

Very fast cable charging (up to 80 watts) fills it quickly, and it charges wirelessly too (50 watts) — just set it on a pad. There's reverse wireless charging to top up earbuds.

A good habit: top it up overnight on your nightstand, the way you'd charge a hearing aid or a watch. You do not need to run it all the way down first — that's an old idea from old batteries. Charge whenever it's handy.

✓ Wireless charging makes it easy

Because this phone charges wirelessly, you can just set it down on a wireless charging pad — no cable to plug in. A pad on the nightstand is the easiest habit of all; I'm glad to recommend a good one.

Staying safe from scams

Your new phone is safe. The people who try to trick you come in by text, email and phone call — and a few simple habits keep you well clear of them.

Motorola, Google, your bank and Amazon will never call, text or email to say your account is locked, your phone is hacked, or you owe money. Those are scams, every time. Don't tap the link, don't call the number, don't read out a code. Just delete it.

Nobody legitimate needs a code you were texted. If someone on the phone asks you to read back a number Google, your bank, or Amazon just sent you, that is a scam in progress. Hang up.

Slow down. Anyone rushing you — "act now," "don't tell anyone," "buy gift cards" — is a scammer. Real companies never work that way. It is always okay to hang up and check with someone you trust.

! A family safe-word beats any scam

Agree on a private word with your family. If a "grandchild" calls in trouble asking for money, ask for the safe word. A real loved one will know it; a scammer won't. And if anything feels off, call me at (330) 200-8042 — I would much rather answer a "silly" question than help clean up after a scam.

Calls, texts and video chats

The whole reason for a phone: keeping close to the people you love. Here's the easy version.

To make a call, open the **Phone** app and tap a name in your Favorites or Recents. To add someone to Favorites, open their contact and tap the star — then they're always one tap away.

To send a text, open **Messages**, tap **Start chat**, type a name, write your note, and tap the send arrow. Remember you can tap the microphone and just speak instead of typing.

To video chat, the built-in **Google Meet** app makes free face-to-face calls with family over Wi-Fi. If your family uses **WhatsApp** instead, that does video calls too. Seeing a grandchild's face is worth the tiny bit of setup, and I'm glad to help with that first call.

✓ Group texts with the family

When several family members are in one text conversation, that's a "group text." You can name it, mute it when it gets chatty, and still catch up later. A nice way to stay in the loop without being buzzed all day.

Help when you need it most

Your phone has real safety features built in. I set these up for every customer, because they can matter enormously.

Emergency SOS: press the **power button five times** quickly and the phone helps you call 911 and can alert the people you choose, sharing your location. Turn it on in **Settings > Safety & emergency**.

Emergency information on the lock screen: you can store your medications, allergies and an emergency contact so first responders can see them even while the phone is locked. Set it up in **Settings > Safety & emergency > Medical information** and **Emergency contacts**.

Add your I.C.E. contacts — "in case of emergency" — so a responder or a passer-by can reach your family quickly. It's a small thing that brings real peace of mind.

★ Let's set up your safety features

Emergency SOS and your medical information take ten minutes to set up and can make all the difference. I include this on every setup visit — or call me at (330) 200-8042 and we'll do it together.

Never lose your phone (or each other)

Google's **Find My Device** (recently renamed Find Hub) helps you locate a misplaced phone — and, if you like, stay aware of family.

Mislaid the phone in the house? From a computer or a family member's phone, go to **google.com/find** (or the Find My Device app), sign in with your Google account, and make your phone **play a sound** — even on silent — so you can follow the chirp to the couch cushions. You can also see it on a map or lock it.

Families often **share locations** in **Google Maps** so they can see each other on a map — a real comfort for adult children and parents alike. It's entirely optional and you choose exactly who can see you.

✓ Turn it on before you need it

Find My Device only helps if it's switched on ahead of time — it usually is by default, but it's worth checking. I'll confirm it's on and show you how to use it, so a lost phone is a five-minute worry instead of an all-day one.

Keeping it current and clutter-free

Two little housekeeping habits keep your phone happy for years.

Software updates keep the phone secure and add new features — for free. When the phone offers one, it's safe to say yes; do it overnight while it's plugged in. You can check any time in **Settings > System > System update**.

A word on how long updates last: Motorola promises a full 7 years of Android updates and security patches — the longest in Motorola's whole lineup, and a match for the big brands. A real point in this phone's favor.

Running low on space? Usually it's photos and videos. Turn on **Google Photos** backup so older pictures live safely in the cloud, and remove apps you never open (press and hold the icon, then **Uninstall**). The phone's **Files** app can also suggest what's safe to clear.

✓ Updates are good news, not a bother

It's tempting to ignore that little update reminder, but updates are how Motorola keeps your phone safe from the latest tricks. If you're ever unsure whether an update is real, check in Settings — the fakes come by text, never from the Settings app.

A few favorite everyday tricks

Little things that make the phone genuinely more useful. Try one at a time.

- **Chop for the flashlight:** make two quick karate-chop motions with the phone in your hand and the flashlight turns on. Chop again to turn it off. Perfect for a dark keyhole.
- **Twist for the camera:** twist your wrist twice and the camera opens straight away — no hunting for the app.
- **Magnifier:** your camera (with Google Lens) doubles as a magnifying glass for small print — menus, labels, instructions — and can read the words aloud.
- **Reminders & timers:** just ask the Assistant — "Hey Google, remind me to call the doctor at ten," "set a timer for the roast."
- **Scan a document:** the **Google Drive** app can take a clean picture of a paper form and save it as a PDF — no printer or scanner needed.

★ Want a tour of the good stuff?

There are dozens of these little helpers, and half the fun of a new phone is discovering the ones that fit your life. On a visit I love showing folks the three or four that'll actually make their day easier. Call (330) 200-8042.

When something's not quite right

Most hiccups have a calm, simple fix. Nine times in ten, it's one of these.

Frozen or acting strange? Restart it. The quickest cure for almost anything is to turn the phone off, wait ten seconds, and turn it back on. Press and hold the **power button** (on some Motorola phones, hold power and volume-up together) and tap **Restart**.

Won't connect to the internet? Swipe down from the top and check that **Wi-Fi** is on and joined to your home network. If your home internet is down, the phone isn't the problem.

Screen too dark or too quiet? Swipe down from the top to reach the **brightness** slider and the **volume** controls — it's surprising how often that's all it is.

★ Stuck? That's what I'm here for

Never wrestle with it alone or feel foolish for asking. A quick call often sorts it out, and if it needs a visit, I can often fix it right on your screen remotely for a flat \$49, or come to you for \$99. Call (330) 200-8042.

Is this the right phone for you?

A straight answer, the way I'd give it at your kitchen table.

Price: as of September 2026 the Motorola Razr Fold (2026) starts around \$1,900. Prices change over time and carriers often lower them with a trade-in, so always check the current price — or just ask me — before you buy.

This phone is a great fit for someone who would love a big, tablet-sized screen for reading, maps and video but wants it to fold down to a normal phone in the pocket — and who values the long 7-year software support.

Consider a different model if: If you want to keep things small, simple and affordable, this is a lot of phone and a lot of money. It's also the heaviest here (243g). A regular Moto or a plain Razr may suit you better.

The Razr Fold is Motorola's showcase phone — a genuine small tablet in your pocket, with the best support Motorola offers. It's also expensive and large. If a big screen truly helps your eyes and you'll use it, it's a wonderful thing; if you mostly call and text, it's more phone than you need. Buy from Motorola, a carrier or a trusted store. I'm glad to help you weigh it up.

★ Not sure which to get? Ask me first

I don't sell phones and I don't earn a commission, so my advice is just honest advice. Tell me how you use your phone and I'll tell you which model — and how to get the best price. Call (330) 200-8042.

You don't have to remember all of it

You just have to remember that a friendly, patient person is one call away.

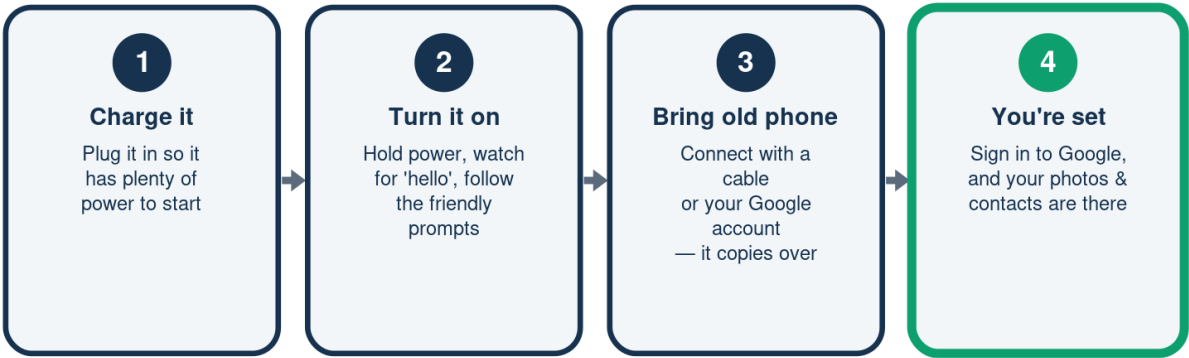

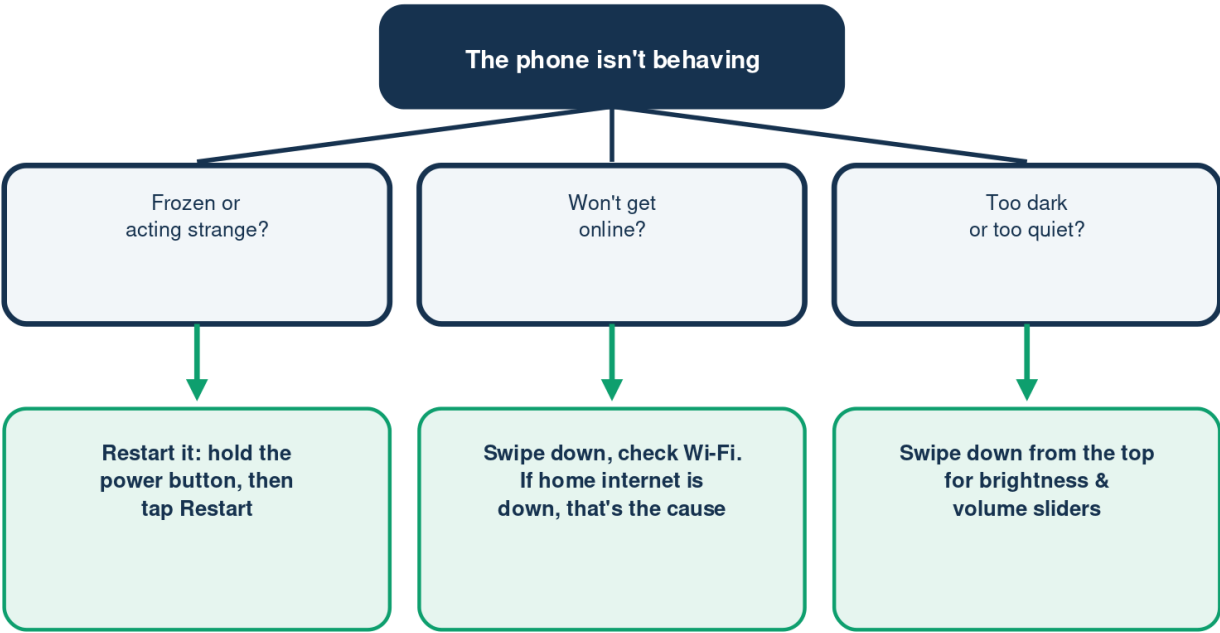
