Common Solar Inverter Myths

fiction, in plain English

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! Read this first — two honest truths about solar inverters

Two honest truths before we start, because they surprise a lot of good folks. First, the inverter is the brains of your solar system, and it ties straight into your home's electrical panel — so choosing one, replacing one, or adding a battery to it is a professional job. It takes a licensed installer, a building permit, and your utility's approval to connect (called interconnection). This guide is here to help you understand and choose wisely; it is not a do-it-yourself project, and I never want you opening a solar inverter or an electrical panel yourself. Second, a plain grid-tied inverter shuts itself off during a power outage, even in bright sunshine, so it cannot put electricity onto the lines while the crews are repairing them. If keeping the lights on during an outage matters to you, you will want a hybrid or battery-capable inverter and a battery — and we will talk about that plainly. Two of the biggest myths are right here in this box — solar keeps your power on in an outage (it doesn't, without a battery), and you can install it yourself (you can't).

Sorting fact from fiction

Solar inverters attract more than their share of myths — some harmless, some that lead to real disappointment or unsafe ideas. This guide gathers the ones I hear most and sets them straight, plainly and kindly, so you can decide with clear eyes.

✓ Plan for one replacement

Myth: 'I can install or replace it myself'

An inverter carries serious voltage, ties into your electrical panel, and connects to the utility grid. Installing or replacing one requires a licensed installer, a permit, and utility approval. This is the myth I most want to bust for your safety. Inverter work is for licensed professionals — always. Understanding is yours; the wiring is theirs.

Myth: 'The most efficient inverter is the best'

Efficiency is real, but it's oversold — here's the balanced truth.

All quality modern inverters are very efficient, and the differences between good ones are small — a sliver of your total power. Chasing the highest efficiency number while ignoring shade handling, warranty, reliability, and fit for your roof is getting the priorities backwards. Efficiency is a tiebreaker, not a headline.

In fact, on a shaded roof, panel-level electronics can capture more total power than a 'more efficient' string inverter — not by converting better, but by keeping shaded panels from dragging down the rest. Capture beats conversion. Our efficiency guide keeps it all in perspective.

✓ Efficiency is a tiebreaker

Let efficiency break a tie between two otherwise-equal inverters. Don't let it lead the decision — fit, shade handling, and warranty deserve that seat.

Myths about the inverter types

The string-versus-micro debate breeds plenty of half-truths.

- **Myth: 'Microinverters are always best.'** They're wonderful for shade and complex roofs, but a plain string can serve an open, sunny roof just as well for less.

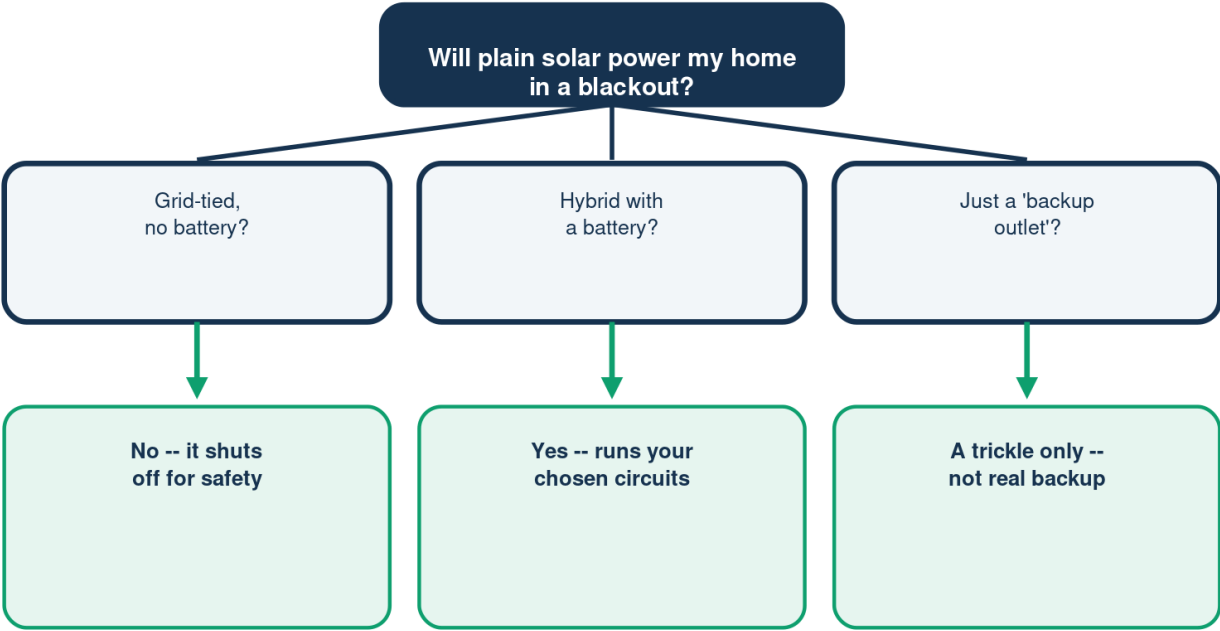

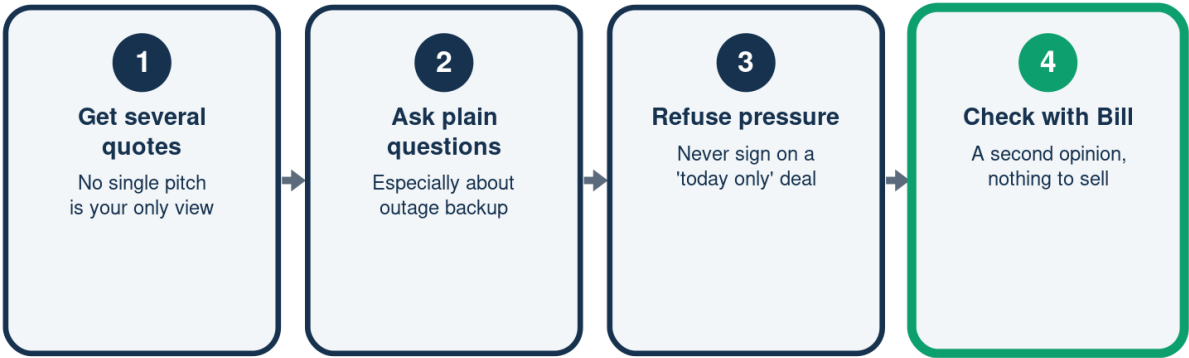
